Get Off of My Lawn!

Jesus said to them, "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's." And they marveled at him. Mark 12:17

Who knew the separation between Church and State could be measured by a few inches? Well, apparently it can. In fact, here in Dover, church and state appear to border each other. There's no wall, no discernable barrier, no drawn line. You need a surveyor to determine the boundary.

I'm sure most of you have noticed the Ten Commandments monument has moved from its place under the trees at the back of the adjacent W. 3rd and N. Wooster greenspace to a position front and center next to the church. It's placed where our former church sign and heirloom bell once rested. (The bell has been moved to the west corner of the church).

Before, the monument was almost hidden, barely noticeable. Now, it highly visible to anyone walking or driving down the street. After the move, someone remarked, "It's like an 'in your face' reminder of God's Law."

So, what's behind this move?

It seems some outside group filed a complaint and threatened a law suit against the City of Dover because the Ten Commandments monument was on city (public) property. To them, it was an infringement of the separation of church and state. It had to go, they warned.

It went, all right! It went from a dark little corner on a city lot, to a "can't miss it" placement out front for all to see and read. I sure hope they're happy now.

The mayor and other city administrators had approached our Property Ministries Board and me and asked if they could donate the monument to us for placement on our property. Of course, we said "Sure!" We coordinated the project together. Moving day was a joint effort, though the city bore most of the work and all the expense. It was much cheaper than fighting a law suit and with a much better outcome.

The separation of Church and State is a much treasured, greatly beneficial and most essential legal concept. It protects both from harmful intrusions from the other. Yet, because the line of separation is not clearly demarcated, it is often hard to determine where it lies. Yes, sometimes the legal concept may be abused. Yet, usually it serves as a great protector of both religious and civic interests.

Jesus understood this when confronted with a question concerning paying taxes. "Give to Caesar what is his and to God what is due Him," he taught.

As citizens, we serve our country and our community in many different ways. As Christians, we also have many wonderful opportunities to serve God. Both are exercises of love—loving neighbor and loving God. And where there is love, there is no separation; no wall keeping us apart.

(P.S. For those who thought this article would be Part II of my fallen tree saga, sorry to disappoint you. The tree is now gone! Hallelujah! Next project, fill that big hole it left and landscape.)

Since You Asked

Since You Asked...

I was surprised to learn the name of the man sheltering Saul (Paul) in Damascus after his conversion was named Judas. The only Judas I've ever hear mention is Judas Iscariot who betrayed Jesus. Are there more?

Indeed, the most famous Judas in Scripture is the notorious betrayer, Judas Iscariot. Judas of Damascus who lived on Straight Street gave Saul (later Paul) a place to stay and pray while waiting for Ananias to restore his sight and baptize him. The two are among several Judas mentioned in the Bible.


Judas is the Greek form of the Hebrew name Judah, a son of Jacob. The name means *praised*. King David was of the house and lineage of Judah and so was Jesus. He is mentioned as an ancestor of Christ in Luke 3:30.

Judas, brother of our Lord is mentioned in Matthew 13:55 and Mark 6:3. Jesus' brothers did not believe in him during his ministry (John 7:5) but are numbered among the believers after Jesus resurrection in Acts 1:14. It is believed the author of the epistle **Jude** is this Judas.

According to Luke 6:16, Jesus had two disciples names Judas. They were **Judas, son of James**, and **Judas Iscariot**. He is distinguished in John 14:22 as "Judas (not Iscariot) said to him, "Lord how is that you will manifest yourself to us..." This Judas may be the disciple called Thaddaeus in Matthew and Mark so as not to confuse him with Judas Iscariot.

Judas of Galilee was a false Messiah and imposter who rose to prominence near the time of Jesus' birth. He perished and afterwards his followers scattered. (Acts 5:37).

At the Council of Jerusalem, Judas Barsabbas was selected by the Early Christian apostles and elders to

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In June, we distributed 100 bags, and have already distributed 72 in July. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.


