It's "Angelo" not "Angela"!

...the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you.

Luke 1:26-28

I really would like to place an angel on the top of my Christmas tree. But, I won't. I can't.

I've looked everywhere to find a fitting angelic tree topper but cannot find one that is "biblically correct." You see, I'm looking for a *male angel* and he is nowhere to be found, except in Scripture.

All the angels offered to trim the Christmas tree either look like Cinderella dressed for the ball, Little Bo Peep adorned with frill and lace or some rendition of Molly the Milkmaid. Not a dude among them. Not at Bronner's, not at 'Tis the Season nor anywhere on the internet. Nowhere! Nada! Nope! Nothing!

The Bible is filled with wonderful angel stories. Those angels who are named are all have distinctly male nomenclature. Here we find Gabriel, Michael and Raphael.

"Angel" comes from the Greek word "angelos" meaning messenger. Gabriel exemplifies this fully. It was he who brought messages from God to Zechariah about the birth of John the Baptist and to Mary about her being chosen to be the virgin mother of Jesus.

Michael is said to be the angel in charge of the protection of earth and the defense of heaven. It is often inferred he is "captain of the guardian angels."

It's altogether possible he was the angel who announced Christ's birth to the shepherds in Bethlehem's fields. It could be.

During this Advent season we will be celebrating God's special messengers and their tidings of great joy. Our Sunday services will feature **Angel Visits**, beginning with an angel's amazing encounter with Abraham. Gabriel's Good News for Zechariah and then Mary follows. Our series concludes with an angel's appearance to Joseph. This all prepares us for the Christmas angels and their heavenly song of "Glory to God in the highest and peace, goodwill to all people on earth."

In the meantime, if you happen to find a male angel during your many seasonal shopping excursions, let me know. I've got just the place for him.

Since You Asked...

Since You Asked...

Did Martin Luther invent the Christmas Tree?

The evergreen fir tree has a long association with Christianity. It began in Germany almost 1,000 years ago when St. Boniface, who converted the German people to Christianity, was said to have come across a group of pagans worshipping an oak tree. According to German folklore, St Boniface is said to have cut down the oak tree in anger and to his amazement a young fir tree sprung up from the roots of the oak tree. St. Boniface took this as a sign of the Christian faith.

Late in the Middle Ages, Germans and Scandinavians placed evergreen trees inside their homes or just outside their doors to show their hope in the forthcoming spring. Our modern Christmas tree evolved from these early traditions.

Legend has it that Martin Luther began the tradition of decorating trees to celebrate Christmas. One crisp Christmas Eve, about the year 1500, he was walking through snow-covered woods and was struck by the beauty of a group of small evergreens. Their branches, dusted with snow, shimmered in the moonlight. When he got home, he set up a little fir tree indoors so he could share this story with his children. He decorated it with candles, which he lighted in honor of Christ's birth. He then told his children that Christ is the Light of the World and had lit up the sky that Christmas Eve.

The Christmas tree tradition most likely came to the United States with Hessian troops during the American Revolution, or with German Lutheran immigrants to Pennsylvania and Ohio.

Some information for this answer comes from an article from the *Christmas Tree Farm Network* written by horticulturist David Robson.

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In October, we distributed 112 bags, and have already distributed 93 in November. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.

The residents eat dinner at 6:00 each evening. All tableware is provided by the shelter, and they ask that if we are just dropping the food off to bring it in disposable pans.

HEALTH KITS AND LAYETTES

Two of our Lutheran World Relief Projects are making Health Kits and School Kits. These kits provide much needed supplies to many people around the world. Items that go into each kit are:

Health Kits

1 hand towel (dark color) 1 wash cloth (dark color),1 bath size bar of soap 1 adult size toothbrush, 1 nail clipper with file 1 wide tooth comb, 6 band-aids

School Kits

Padded or spinal notebooks of ruled paper approx. 8 1/2" X 11" totaling 150-200 sheets; do not include loose leaf paper

> 1 blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)

1 30-centimeter ruler, or ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other

1 pencil sharpener, 1 eraser approx. 2 1/2 "long

6 new, unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band

12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors

1 box of 16 or 24 crayons
