Welcome Back!

We missed you.

We are very hopeful that we can begin worshipping together again on Sunday, June 7 with services at 8:00 and 10:30 a.m.

Below you will find the *annotated* version of the poster displayed at all entrances. Please limit your entry to the doors on W. 3rd Street and near the corner green space. This will include the "limited accessibility entrance."

So that we may worship safely and comfortably together:

Please observe 6-feet "social distancing."

- **Facial coverings are <u>Required</u>**. (Love your neighbor as yourself. Protect them as you would want to be protected. If you forgot yours, there are some disposable facial *coverings available.*)
- Hand sanitizer is available. Please retain for future use. (Hand sanitizer is provided for all worshippers 12 years old and older. You may bring your own or use the one provided.)
- **Please sit in designated pews only.** (*If you see a sign that says, "Please do not Sit Here," please comply. Seats available are marked with blue tape at the end of the pew.*)
- **Hymnals, Bibles and other materials have been removed from the pews.** (If you wish to follow the Scripture readings, **BYOB**—Bring your own Bible.)
- **We will observe "no contact" offering collection.** (*If needed, pew envelopes are available on the table in the narthex. Collection plates are located near the sanctuary entrances.*)
- **Discard bulletins in recyclables baskets after use.** (*Our worship service has been adapted for safety reasons. There will be no congregational singing. Spoken responses are kept to a minimum. The service will be significantly shorter.*)
- **Dispose of used "Communion Sets" in black trash bins.** (Each worshipper wishing to take Communion is supplied with a "No contact" Communion set. It contains a wafer and grape juice. We will partake of Holy Communion as a congregation following the Words of Institution.)
- Avoid "mingling" after the worship service and at all times maintain "social distancing."
- If you have a fever or you are not feeling well, please return home. (*Take care. Be safe God bless you.*)



I've heard you've shared your Banana Banana Bread recipe with some folks. How about sharing it with all of us? It sounds delicious!

Did you know the **Number One** internet recipe search during the pandemic shutdown was for Banana Bread? It must be a great comfort food in times like these. Either that, or people had a lot of over-ripening bananas to use up really fast.

I was one of the many recipe hunters. This is the recipe I discovered. It's a very good and tasty addition to my baking repertoire. If you've got the bananas, this is the recipe for you.

Banana Banana Bread

READY IN: 1hr 15mins

SERVES: 12

YIELD: 1 9x5 loaf


INGREDIENTS

2 cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking soda 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup butter ³/₄ cups brown sugar2 large eggs, beaten2 ¹/₂-3 cups mashed overripe bananas

DIRECTIONS


Preheat oven to 350°. Lightly grease 9 x 5 loaf pan. In large bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt. In separate bowl, cream together butter and brown sugar. Stir in eggs and mashed bananas until well blended Stir banana mixture into flour mixture; stir just to moisten. Pour batter into prepared loaf pan.

Bake in preheated oven for 60-65 minutes until a toothpick inserted into center of loaf comes out clean. Let bread cool in pan for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack.

He Be Stylin'—Again! Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me. Matthew 25:40 Just what I need! Another opportunity to make a fashion statement. Another chance to be fashion forward. But it has happened. That's how I've been approaching the safety-conscious, health-wise guidelines to wear a facial covering whenever I'm out in the public. "Wherever two or three are gathered...,"I've most usually got one on. It's an occasion to be stylin'! Most of you know of my mega-tremendous tie collection. I've got a whole closet full. Ties have been one of my personal accouterments since junior high-maybe even before. Yes. I wore one to school several days a week. They would add a touch of class and flash to my ensemble. Still today, I wear a tie on most days. If I don't, someone will say, "Pastor! I've never seen you without a tie before." Don't get used to it. Now, I have another accessory—a facial covering (aka mask). I'm using this well-attested health and safety precaution to enhance my attire. I have one in basic black and others with festive prints. I even have one with a leopard print for my sojourns "up north." By the time this newsletter reaches your mailbox or email, I'll probably have a few more. I'm expecting one that depicts an Ohio University Bobcat. Grrr! What's really neat is that when I'm not wearing it, I can keep it handy and use it as a dandy pocket square with a suit jacket or sport coat. What a dashing and debonair accent to my outfit! When it comes down to it, the ultimate reason for wearing a facial covering is to express love, respect, and concern, especially for our most vulnerable neighbors. In times like these, they are "the least among us" and need our most tender care and caution. As the governor of North Dakota recently remarked (and I paraphrase), when you see a person wearing a mask, maybe it's because they have a five-year-old at home undergoing cancer treatments. Or, maybe they have close, older relatives who are highly susceptible to the disease and its harrowing, even deadly consequences. These people are doing it for them. Yes. I've heard the excuses. Facial coverings can be uncomfortable and inconvenient. But then, it would be far more uncomfortable and inconvenient being hooked up to a ventilator. Some think they make them look weak or silly. Well, have you ever seen yourself in a full-length mirror wearing a hospital gown-especially from the back? If you are looking to make a political or social statement, there are better and safer ways to do this. Get over it! Do it for the least among us. In these difficult, trying, and unsettling times, we can hold on to our faith and express it in many caring and helpful ways. "Love your neighbor as yourselves," Jesus commands us. Again, as St. James teaches, "If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, 'Love your neighbor as yourself,' you are doing right." Wearing a facial covering can be lovely and truly loving. It's not so much a matter of what's on our face but what's in our hearts. Amen.

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Grocery bag distribution is temporarily suspended. We expect when it resumes, the need will be great. We are still accepting food and monetary donations.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. <u>Grocery size</u> <u>paper bags are also needed.</u>


