St. Patrick, We Hardly Knew Ye

For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, 'Abba! Father!' it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ...

Romans 8:15-17

Here's a shocker! St. Patrick wasn't Irish at all. He was English. It's strange how the Irish patron saint hails from a country against which they hold such great animosity.

As a young English lad, Patrick was kidnapped by Irish pirates and sold into slavery. For years he toiled in Irish fields until he escaped back to his homeland. In thanksgiving for his deliverance, Patrick entered a monastery and prepared for the priesthood.

Because Father Patrick was so familiar with the Irish language, culture and customs, the English bishop sent him to Ireland. There Patrick would open a new mission field and proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Without any bitterness, he would selflessly and boldly serve the people who once enslaved him.

Uh oh! St. Patrick's favorite color was not green. It was blue. In fact, the people of Ireland were not very fond of green. It was associated with fairies and leprechauns and unless you wanted to be ensnared by these wee folk, you would refrain from wearing that color. It wasn't until the 19th Century that green became the official color of the Emerald Isle.

Say what? According to folklore, St. Patrick was supposed to have rid Ireland of all snakes, driving them into the sea. The thing is Ireland never had any snakes. Nada. Zilch. (But perhaps, you already knew that.)

Whew! The stories about St. Patrick using the shamrock to teach the truth of the Holy Trinity appear to be true. Because he was so familiar with Irish culture, St. Patrick knew the Irish Druids believed the shamrock was a sacred plant that could ward off evil. The Irish Celtics believed the shamrock had mystical properties due to the plant's three heart-shaped leaves. They also believed three was a sacred number. Understanding this valuable context, St. Patrick used the one plant-three leaves as tool for teaching the One God-Three Persons concept of Trinity.

As I reflected on St. Patrick's epic life, it occurred to me that all of us have been kidnapped and enslaved by sin. It is this sin that separates us from our Heavenly Father and our homeland in heaven.

That is why God sent his beloved Son Jesus-to rescue us and deliver us from this bondage to sin so that we might know the righteousness of God, live in love's true freedom and return at last to our eternal homeland, a place prepared for us in heaven. As Jesus reminds us, "Very truly I tell you, everyone who commits a sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed." (John 8:34-36)

As we observe St. Patrick's Day and continue our journey through Lent, may we truly treasure our life-transforming freedom in Christ. For we are no longer slaves to sin, but cross-redeemed free children of God and full heirs of God's eternal kingdom of glory and grace. Thanks be to God! Amen.

Since You Asked...

Since You Asked...

The date for Easter always changes from year to year. How is the date for Easter determined?

The First Council of Nicaea* in 325 AD established the date of Easter as the first Sunday after the first full moon which happens upon or immediately following the 21st day of March. If the first full moon happens upon a Sunday, Easter Day is the Sunday after."

Why such an odd definition? March 21 is the **vernal equinox** -- the day on which the length of daylight equals the length of darkness as the days are lengthening in the spring. The traditional Jewish calendar is based on moon phases, which is how the phase of the moon enters into the definition. When they were determining what day Easter would fall on, they deferred to the Jewish practice of using moon phases to decide the timing of holidays. Thus, Christianity's Easter corresponds to the Jewish Passover in both date and symbolism.

Using this method, Easter can only occur between March 22 and April 25. This year, we celebrate Easter on April 8. Easter will be celebrated on March 31 next year 2013.*This is also the Church Council which gave us the Nicene Creed.

2012 ELCA Youth Gathering – July 18-22 Citizens with the Saints: Ephesians 2:14-20

What will the Youth do for three days in New Orleans?

They will Practice Justice, Practice Peacemaking and Practice Discipleship.

Practice Justice will be the "Service" Day. It will begin in the Superdome with "dwelling in the Word" which is bible study and worship (Learn Justice), followed

by a multi-media experience reminding young people about the tragedy of Hurricane Katrina (Walk Justice). They will board a bus which will take groups to their service site (Practice Justice). They will focus on environment and literacy, because that is what New Orleans leaders tell ELCA planners what is needed now. Not all justice experiences will involve physical work. All will return to the Superdome where they will unpack their experiences (Reflect Justice). Practice Peacemaking will be the Interaction Center Day, and will begin with "dwelling in the Word" (bible study/worship) in the auditorium at the Convention Center. Groups will go to the Interaction Center and/or participate in other interactive learning opportunities (i.e., workshops) throughout the building. Practice Discipleship Day will be working together as a **SYNOD**. This day will begin with "dwelling in the Word" lead by a team of leaders from the synod, hopefully including the Bishop. Groups will be sent into the city of New Orleans with guidance to focus on the 7 Faith Practices. Each day will have 1/3 of the Gathering community assigned to Practice Justice; 1/3 assigned to Practice Peacemaking; 1/3 assigned to Practice discipleship. Groups will be assigned the days, they will know each prior to coming. Each evening all 36,000 youth will attend the Mass Gathering at the Superdome.

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In January, we distributed 118 bags, and have already distributed 73 in February. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


We are resuming our Healing Prayers at the Altar rail during Holy Communion.

Personal Care Kits

1 light weight bath towel (dark color) 2 bath size bars of soap, 1 wide tooth comb 1 adult size toothbrush, 1 nail clipper with file School Kits

4 - 70 sheet notebooks of ruled paper approx. 8 1/2" X 11"; do not include loose leaf paper

1 blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)

1 30-centimeter ruler, or ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other

1 pencil sharpener, 1 eraser approx. 2 1/2 " long

5 new, unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band

12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors

1 box of 16 or 24 crayons,5 black or blue ball point pens - no gel ink; secure with a rubber band.




