Every once in a while, I receive a joke, cartoon or information in an email that is just too good not to share. Recently, a volunteer at St. Luke Lutheran Community, North Canton, whom I worked with for several years, sent me this humorous, yet, oh, so poignant story.

Recently, actress and vocalist Julie Andrews made a special appearance at New York's Radio City Music Hall for the benefit of AARP. To commemorate her own birthday, Andrews sang a song from always popular movie **The Sound of Music.** However, when she sang "My Favorite Things," she sang it to new lyrics.

Here are the lyrics she sang. It helps if you hum the tune or sing along while reading. (My apologies to grammatists and punctuation purists.)

"Botox and nose drops and needles for knitting, Walkers and handrails and new dental fittings, Bundles of magazines tied up in string, These are a few of my favorite things.... Cadillacs and cataracts, hearing aids and glasses, Polident and Fixodent and false teeth in glasses, Pacemakers, golf carts and porches with swings, These are a few of my favorite things....

When the pipes leak, When the bones creak, When the knees go bad, I simply remember my favorite things, And then I don't feel so bad.

Since You Asked



Dear Pastor Rice: Would you explain the Lutheran seasons and the colors for the paraments and vestments? Thank you.

The church year begins with Advent and concludes with Christ the King Sunday. During this year, there are five seasons, each with their particular liturgical colors.

Advent paraments are blue which is the color of royalty. Advents prepares us to welcome the newborn King.

Christmas season is celebrated with white paraments and vestments. White symbolizes the purity, holiness and virtue of the innocent Christ child. White is also the color for celebration, thanksgiving and heavenly glory.

Green is the color for **Epiphany**. Green symbolizes the renewal of the earth, physical and spiritual growth and the promise of new life.

Christian penitence and the suffering of Christ are represented by purple during Lent.

Easter season is celebrated with the color white, the color of heavenly glory and resurrection. Easter Sunday itself may use gold paraments and vestments to celebrate Christ's resurrection glory and majesty and the promises of heaven.

Pentecost Sunday is commemorated with red, the color of fire, the presence of God and the Holy Spirit. **Pentecost** season's color is green representing spiritual growth and our earthy journey of faith in Christ.

Other church festivals and commemorations may have their own color of the day. Reformation Sunday is red; All Saints, Holy Trinity and Christ the King Sundays are white. Palm Sunday is rose to symbolize the joy and happiness

Kuhn You Hear What I Hear?

Phase II of our Kuhn Pipe Organ repair, renovation and refurbishment began February 18. The work project continues through the end of March. In the meantime, we will rely on piano and keyboard accompaniment for our worship services. We are assured work will be completed before Palm Sunday, April 14.

Should look up at our organ from the sanctuary, the work will be done on the pipes and other instrumentation on the right side of the organ. Last year, **Phase I** included the pipes on the left side and the organ console itself. **Phase II** completes all scheduled repairs and refurbishments and includes the installation of a new Syndyne switching system with MIDI board.

The work would be done by Peebles-Herzog Pipe Organ Company, Columbus, OH who also did last year's work and with whom we have a continuing service contract for tuning and adjustments, etc. Grace Planning Council, during its July 2018 meeting, approved funds from the Lewis Memorial Capital Improvements Fund pay for the project.



Protecting Our Children

For pressing security reasons, the back two doors in Luther Hall will be locked during the hours Head Start children are in the building for classes. Head Start classes are in session Monday through Thursday, from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. This protection is what is mandated and expected in our public schools. This safety precaution went into effect Tuesday, February 19.



GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In January, we distributed 102 bags, and have already distributed 110 in February. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. <u>Grocery size</u> <u>paper bags are also needed.</u>




