# O Captain, My Captain

For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes. I Corinthians 11:26

One of my favorite and most rewarding responsibilities as pastor is preparing our young people for their First Communion. We usually plan instruction for early November so that the youth and their families may take Holy Communion together during the Advent and the Christmas holidays. I pray this brings them greater joy and deeper meaning to the sacred season of Jesus' birth and His gifts of saving grace.

Of course, First Communion instruction is serious business. This is a big step in their faith journey and life in the church. It is about understanding Holy Communion as a *Means of Grace* and believing Jesus' body and blood is in, with and through the bread and the wine.

One of our first exercises is talking about bread and wine.

I ask the learners to name all the kinds of bread they might find at home or in the grocery store. The list is usually a long one. It includes white bread, whole wheat, rye, pumpernickel, pita, English muffins and even pizza crust.

I then ask them if they can name different kinds of wine. I give them a clue that wines are usually known by their color. This elicits responses of red, white and pink (rose). We also include grape juice.

Then, I ask if there might be any more. Usually, by this point the list is complete. But not always.

One year, a young boy raised his hand, waved it about so as to be sure to get my attention. "Yes? What else might we add to our list?" I asked. "Captain Morgan!" he boldly replied.

Needless to say, this response got a big laugh from the group while the boy's mother seemed to slowly slide down her chair onto the floor and under the table. We quickly learned the mother worked in the food and beverage industry, so the boy was had become acquainted and intrigued with the libation there.

Though Captain Morgan may be a potent potable, it has nowhere near the potency and power of Holy Communion. In this blessed Sacrament, the Holy Spirit diligently and faithfully works to renew, strengthen, empower and direct our faith that we might leave the Lord's Table fully equipped to do God's will and serve one another in love. You sure won't find that in a bottle—even on the top shelf. It comes to us only from the Cup of our Lord.

In just a few weeks, we will have another First Communion class. I eagerly look forward to another opportunity to share our basic Lutheran teachings and our traditional Grace practices with our young people. Even more so, I look forward to the First Sunday in Advent and their first steps to the Lord's Table, their First Holy Communion and their first newly-experienced blessings of love and grace in Jesus' name. Amen.


# Since You Asked...

Pastor Rice, I recently had a Lutheran friend from out of town attend church with me. She noted we made the "sign of the cross" several times during the service. "We don't do that at my church," she remarked. She wondered why some Lutheran churches make the "sign of the cross" and others don't.

Though it is most prominently displayed in the Roman Catholic Church and Eastern Orthodox churches, the "sign of the cross" is also widely practiced in the Lutheran, Anglican, Episcopalian and other liturgical churches. As for the "sign of the cross" in Lutheran churches, it is largely a matter of preference and tradition. Many Lutheran churches demonstrate it during the course of their worship services in keeping with time-honored, historical church practices. Many others refrain, especially those who choose to distinguish themselves from Roman Catholic liturgical practices. (Some consider this as a "side-effect" of the Reformation.)

The "sign of the cross" was featured in the earliest Christian congregations. Its history goes back at least as far as Tertullian, the early Church Father who lived between A.D. 160 and 220. Tertullian wrote, "In all our travels and movements, in all our coming in and going out, in putting off our shoes, at the bath, at the table, in lighting our candles, in lying down, in sitting down, whatever employment occupieth us, we mark our foreheads with the sign of the cross."

Originally, a small cross was traced by the thumb or finger on one's own forehead. While it is difficult to pinpoint exactly when the switch was made from tracing a small cross on the forehead to the modern practice of tracing a larger cross from forehead to chest and shoulder to shoulder, we do know that the switch had occurred by the eleventh century A.D., when the Prayer Book of King Henry provides an instruction to "mark with the holy cross the four sides of the body."





#### **GROCERY BAG MINISTRY**

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In September, we distributed 141 bags, and have already distributed 109 in October. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. **Grocery size** paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


