TURF WARS!

The big news in nearby Carrollton is the high school stadium is getting artificial turf in time for this year's football season. Crowds gather daily to cheer on the grounds crews as they complete their work in time for the first home game.

Dover experienced the same excitement last year when artificial turf was rolled out in the Brickhouse. Constant picture updates appeared on Facebook as the project progressed from a few green patches to a beautifully finished field.

My alma mater Louisville has had artificial turf since it built its stunning new stadium in 2010. It truly is a sight to behold. From entry to press box to goalposts, it is a gridiron gem.

The reserved seats are splendid and get better every year. Initially, they were simple blue seats with backs. No benches or bleachers in this section. Each person had their own space without fear of encroachment from a neighboring derrière. Still, there was room for improvement.

The next year, the seats were comfortably padded and could recline. Of course, tickets prices increased to pay for the welcome adjustment. A few years later, the seats were heated to keep ardent fans warm during cold, inclement weather. And again, seating prices went up, but it was well worth it.

This year, prices have gone up again. Now the seats not only recline and warm up, they also come with adjustable massage options. Plus, with the required wiring, it was decided to extend a texting capacity to the right armrest so fans can order their food and beverages from the concession stand (\$10 minimum) and have it delivered by a friendly member of the Leopard Booster Club.

The new stadium and all its improvements have been achieved with nary a taxpayer dollar. It's all been paid for by fans, citizens and local business. It helps to have Biery Cheese and Chesapeake Oil making major contributions. (What a combination—cheese & gas!)

Of course, what's most important is what's happening on the field. If your team is not doing well, no seat is comfortable. If there is a display of unsportsmanlike conduct, uneasy squirming is likely no matter where you sit.

On the other hand, if your team is doing well and on its way to victory, even a warping aluminum bench offers contentment. Fair and honorable gamesmanship warms the heart and soul on even the coldest October night.

As we enter this fall sports season, we pray players, officials, band members and fans alike will be ambassadors of goodwill to all. May everything said and done be pleasing to God and glorify Him. This can be a challenge, especially when a contest becomes heated, but it is well worth remembering and putting into practice. You can think of it as your own version of strength-conditioning, with our strength coming from the Lord.

By the way, I hear Louisville is going to install a retractable dome over its stadium next year or soon thereafter. I wonder how much those blue seats will cost then?

Since You Asked...

Since You Asked...

What is the right way to dispose of an old, worn out or damaged Bible?

There is no "biblical" way to dispose of a damaged or ruined Bible, as the Bible itself does not address this question. It is, therefore, a matter of personal conviction. It is important to understand that it is not the paper, binding, and ink that are "sacred" or "holy." It is the Word of God that is holy and a means of grace, not the material it is printed on.

Some people feel that an old Bible should be buried or ceremonially burned (like a US flag). If you feel that is respectful and important, this would be an appropriate and honorable thing to do. Just don't do it as a spectacle, but with quiet reverence.

Another excellent option is to recycle the Bible. I recently discovered a little prayer that can accompany such a ritual. "O Lord of Knowledge and Truth, these pages once read, now yellowing and brittle, are returned for renewal. May they make new paper on which truth, beauty and joy may be found. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.




CELEBRATION 2014

May God bless these children with health and happiness as they live in God's love and grow in God's grace.






Wanted: Smiling Faces —Especially Yours!





GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In July, we distributed 124 bags, and have already distributed 120 in August. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


