
What is a flesh pot? This word is from the First lesson, Exodus 16:3, on August 2nd.

My education plan is to ultimately obtain a Bachelor's degree in the Science of Nursing (BSN). I am currently looking to finish my second year of the Associate degree nursing program at Kent State Tuscarawas this coming fall. Since beginning the program at Kent I have found that my passion for helping others has been solidified in the field of nursing. Once I was accepted into the nursing program and started working with the patients, experienced instructors and the staff at my clinical sites, I knew that nursing was going to be my lifelong career. My Mother in law Linda has been a nurse for 47 years, and still works to this day, she is a great influence on my career. To see someone work that hard for that long, because she loves what she does, is truly inspiring. I am inspired by so many nurses that I have had the chance to meet and work with, and even some that I haven't officially met.

Since 6 weeks of age my youngest niece Mila has struggled with multiple medical problems. She was born with complications of her urinary tract and kidneys. Mila was in and out of the hospital for the first year of her life for multiple surgeries and has been to countless doctors' appointments, ultrasounds, scans, procedures, and check-ups. She was not suspected to have a full recovery; she would not have function of one kidney and would eventually need a transplant. While my sister spent countless nights in the hospital with her daughter, she was always telling stories about the medical staff, but in particular, the nurses. The nurses that cared for Mila, did just that, they cared for her. Physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually they were by my sister and niece's side through this very trying time. To this day my sister raves about the nurses she has encountered and how they are one of Gods' many gifts. Those are the nurses that I look up to and that I strive to be like. They were not just there to work 8 hours and go home. Day in and day out they were caregivers to my family and were a gift from God to my sister, in the hardest time of her life. The nurses that treated her are such an inspiration to me because I believe that when you serve your community and serve families as my family was served, it makes a difference. Miraculously in Mila's most recent ultrasound, the results were stunning, her kidney was healing, something the doctors never thought would happen. I will strive in my career to help and care for my patients as my family has been cared for, and how all families should be cared for, to help the needy and the sick, and to be there for all people in need.

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In July, we distributed 147 bags, and have already distributed 128 in August. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.

Wedding Congratulations




