In celebration of the **500**th **Anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation**, our fall Bible Study will take a close look at some of our most basic Lutheran doctrines. We compare and contrast them with the faith expressions of other Christian denominations and discover **The Lutheran Difference.** Of course, we cannot hope to cover all the similarities and divergences between Lutherans and other Christian churches, but we will take time to cover some of the more pronounced distinctions.

"Aren't Lutherans pretty much just like Roman Catholics?" No, they are not. "Aren't Lutherans just another Protestant church?" No. Not really. There are distinctions that make a real difference.



Renovating both restrooms making both handicapped accessible;

Widening the doorway to lounge and a doorway to multipurpose room to make both handicapped accessible:

Replace flooring in kitchen and multipurpose room;

Painting walls, doors and doorways;

Replacing ceilings throughout the hall and connecting room; and

Installing safer railing in the connecting room.

Proceeds from the fund are available only for capital improvement projects as approved by both the Property Ministries Board and Grace Planning Council. Women ELCA

Lutheran World Relief Final Project Numbers for 2016

ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton thanked Women of the ELCA voting members for their work in the church during the final session of Tenth Triennial Convention, July 13.

"You lead the church in so many ways," said Eaton. "You are mobilizing our congregations and communities through prayer, ministry and political action."

She thanked the organization for working to educate others about human trafficking.

"One thing that has been particularly important for this past triennium is to raise up the horror of human trafficking that is so prevalent all around the world," she said. "And this is just a scourge, and it mostly affects children, women and girls. "So, thank you for the work in that, and some really creative ways of addressing this."

For example, some synodical women's organizations pass out bars of S.O.A.P. (save our adolescents from prostitution) to motels, casinos and other places where human trafficking is likely to occur. The soap is wrapped with a red band that provides the National Human Trafficking Hotline number (1-888-373-7888).

Others are educating employees of convention centers, motels and casinos about the signs of human trafficking and working with politicians to create legislation supporting anti-trafficking laws.

"You've also been instrumental in helping us work with international leaders— women, a program where women from our companion synods across the globe have a chance to further their education. Your president and your director have helped to support this. We now have 12 young women who have studied in the United States. Another group is coming over this year. They get four-year scholarships. Our ELCA colleges and universities provide half, and the international leaders—women program provides the other half. These are amazing leaders who are committed to going back to their home countries and their home churches."

Eaton praised Women of the ELCA for getting solar power to Phebe Hospital in rural Liberia.

"An Ebola epidemic hit that country, and Phebe Hospital was a major place for treatment. You helped raise money to install solar panels," she said. "Not only are you providing healthcare, you are providing sustainable, renewable energy in a country where that's still being developed. You're right on the cutting edge."

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In July, we distributed 119 bags, and have already distributed 82 in August. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


